
Allen Q410 Digital Organ (2011)

Notes: Tonight's Organ Vespers features the Bryn Athyn Church's choirs. The sung service of Evensong has its roots in the canonical hours of Medieval Christianity. The hours themselves developed in response to several Old Testament instructions for daily prayer, including Psalm 119:164 "Seven times in the day do I praise Thee...". Evensong is a beautiful and beloved daily service in the Anglican Church combining elements of the last two of these services: that of Vespers (sunset) and Compline (bedtime).

The music selected for tonight's Organ Vespers was composed by organist/choirmasters in England over the long history of Evensong. The same texts and formats are used each day, and different musical compositions can provide variety within the rote familiarity of the tradition. Parts of the **Preces** and **Responses** (William Smith 1603-1645) are still part of the call and response tradition inherited by Bryn Athyn Cathedral, found in the liturgy at our Adult Service each Sunday. Their older form, heard here, is entirely sung.

The earliest Christians are known to have made frequent use of the Psalms in early forms of prayer and worship and chanting Psalms was part of the canonical hours from their earliest versions. An Anglican **Double Chant** (Herbert Howells 1892-1983) is a formula for singing a short fragment of four-part harmony where choirs can fit the words of non-metric Psalm translations to the music, providing a simple and repetitive musical meditation for each Psalm.

Non-Psalm texts that were sung by Biblical figures are called "canticles" and several of the daily prayer hours feature a canticle. Since the **Magnificat** (canticle of Mary, Luke 1:46-55) and **Nunc Dimittis** (canticle of Simeon, Luke 2:29-32) are to be sung daily at Vespers and Compline respectively, Evensong contains them both. Many Anglican composers have provided musical settings for this pair of song texts, including Herbert Murrill (1909-1952).

Evensong contains a wealth of prayer through music in addition to the spoken prayers and readings. Along with the items listed above, the liturgy for Evensong includes a choir anthem and organ voluntary. We'll sing two anthems with the choristers: a Psalm celebration composed in 2018 for Graham by Daniel Justin (b. 1990) and a lengthy hymn arrangement by Edward Bairstow (1874-1946) written for his choir at York Minster a century earlier in 1914. This being a series featuring our organs, Leah will intersperse three "voluntaries" from the English tradition, by Frank Bridge (1879-1941), Bairstow, and Alec Rowley (1892-1958).

Leah Martin joined the Bryn Athyn Church staff as Principal Organist in 2023. She holds a BM in organ performance from Indiana University Jacobs School of Music, and a Master of Sacred Music in organ performance at University of Notre Dame where she is also currently completing her doctorate.
